

## **UPEI Position Paper** on the revision of the Energy Taxation Directive (ETD)

14 October 2025

## Introduction

UPEI, the voice of Europe's independent energy and mobility suppliers, appreciates the efforts made by the Danish Presidency of the EU Council to conclude the negotiations on the revised ETD by end 2025.

UPEI fully embraces the EU's carbon neutral objectives and calls on policymakers to ensure that the energy taxation legislative framework remains practical, harmonised, and proportionate.

## **UPEI Recommendations**

UPEI supports an energy-content-based taxation model, but the ETD revision should also offer an opportunity to review the ETS2: indeed, if we carbon emissions can be effectively controlled through additional taxation, the need for ETS2 might be eliminated entirely. This would overcome the issues raised by the current overlay of ETS2 obligations onto the excise duty regime of the ETD, that bring duplicative regulation and additional administrative burdens for fuel suppliers.

We therefore also support the attention brought in the European Parliament's draft Opinion to regulatory overlaps between the ETD and ETS2, which sectors (transport and buildings) will face a combination of fuel taxation, compliance costs and emission charges.

## **UPEI** recommends:

- Introducing mandatory tax exemptions for advanced biofuels, RFNBOs, and lowcarbon alternatives.
- Including LNG under the Excise Movement and Control System (EMCS) for uniform treatment.
- Issuing an implementing act to clarify taxation of blended products, including clear setup aligned with the ETS2 required proof of renewable. This to ensure there will be no need for separate double reporting on same renewable molecule for ETS2 and Excise "rebates"
- Maintaining the mandatory tax exemption for energy products for the maritime transport.

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
Ensuring a consistent implementation of the revised Directive at Member States level. Conclusion
